Isaac: Some Basic Historical Facts

- He was a miracle baby, much like John the Baptist.
 - He was the son God promised to Abraham.
- He was the first to be circumcised on the eighth day.
 - He was the only son of Abraham and Sarah.
- He was the second of Israel's three Patriarchs and the only one whose name was not changed.
 - He was given the same promises as Abraham.
 - His name means "*he laughed.*"
 - He was the father of Esau and Jacob.


God Is Guiding Isaac's Life

Genesis 26:1-2 (NIV)

Now there was a famine in the land--besides the earlier famine of Abraham's time--and Isaac went to Abimelech king of the Philistines in Gerar. The LORD appeared to Isaac and said, "Do not go down to Egypt; live in the land where I tell you to live.

Genesis 26:3-6 (NIV)

Stay in this land for a while, and I will be with you and will bless you. For to you and your descendants I will give all these lands and will confirm the oath I swore to your father Abraham. I will make your descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and will give them all these lands, and through your offspring all nations on earth will be blessed, because Abraham obeyed me and kept my requirements, my commands, my decrees and my laws." So Isaac stayed in Gerar.

The Incidents Recorded Here
Have Some Déjà Vu
From The Life Of Abraham.

1.

When Isaac Arrived, He Passed His Wife, Rebekah, Off As His Sister Out Of Fear.

- Abraham had once settled in the same region and done the same thing regarding Sarah.
- He did so out of fear for his life. His faith still had some growing to do.
 - Abimelech saw Isaac caressing Rebekah and discovered the truth. He was furious at being deceived.

Abimelech Does Damage Control

Genesis 26:10-11 (NIV)

Then Abimelech said, "What is this you have done to us? One of the men might well have slept with your wife, and you would have brought guilt upon us." So Abimelech gave orders to all the people: "Anyone who molests this man or his wife shall surely be put to death."

2.

A Political Power Struggle Begins

- Isaac takes advantage of his “Diplomatic Immunity,” takes control of some land, plants crops, and was blessed by the Lord with a huge harvest.
- This upsets the Philistines and out of envy, they start filling up the wells that Abraham had dug.
- He became so wealthy with crops, flocks, herds and servants that the Philistines envied him.
- Likely, from fear of Isaac’s power and political pressure, Abimelech tells him to move elsewhere.

3.

Isaac Seeks Peace In Midst of Turmoil

- Isaac moves to the Valley of Gerar and settles again.
- Isaac reopens the wells dug by Abraham that had been filled in by the Philistines.
- Isaac dug a new well that had “fresh” (running water) in it, which was rare, the Philistines heard about that well and claimed it was theirs.
- Isaac dug another well; the Philistines claimed it too.
- Isaac moves on yet again and digs another well, gets to keep it and names it Rehoboth, (room).

Isaac Had Become Rich And Powerful

- He could have fought back but did not.
- He remembers that he is a resident alien, living in a land that is not yet his.
- Each time, he chose to move on, remembering this was not his home.
 - He sought and pursued peace at great cost.
- His example is very much like the teaching of one of his yet unborn relatives, Jesus Christ.

The New Testament Speaks To This.

Matthew 5:38-42 (NIV)

"You have heard that it was said, 'Eye for eye, and tooth for tooth.' But I tell you, Do not resist an evil person. If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also. And if someone wants to sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. If someone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. Give to the one who asks you, and do not turn away from the one who wants to borrow from you.

1 Timothy 2:1-5 (NIV)

I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone—for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. 1 Peter 2:11-12 (NIV)



2 Peter 3:11-13 (NIV)
